

Annual Report for 2012 – 2013, September 23, 2013

Waihora Ellesmere Trust (WET) is a community organisation dedicated to the improvement of the health and biodiversity of Te Waihora/Lake Ellesmere and its catchment.

The Trust

- Fairly steady membership of around 100 120 members (individual/family) plus 5 organisations
- A total of 292 subscribers to the website/newsletter, steadily increasing (includes members with email addresses)
- 2 staff members General Manager and Finance Manager
- Contracted Restoration Consultant, working on the Sustainable Drain Management project and also with schools
- Several active volunteers, working on specific projects and assisting with events
- Existing MOUs with ECan, CCC and TAK. In 2012/13 we reviewed our MOU with TAK and signed a new MOU with SDC

Funding & support

- Core funding for 2012/13 from ECan, SDC and CCC
- Statutory Agencies Group facilitation funding
- Office space provided by ECan
- Additional funding from project funding for 2012/3 this included Community Environment Fund and Sustainable Farming Fund, Creative Communities (SDC) funding, with some additional funding from DOC for a project to commence in 2014.

The Action Plan

- WET's Action Plan was formally adopted at the 2012 AGM
- The Action Plan now guides the day to day work of the Trust and provides a framework for our annual reporting to the community.

Keeping in touch

- The WET website is regularly updated with information about events, items of interest and lake level updates. Photos of events are posted on our Facebook page (with Twitter notifications)
- Around 6,400 visits to the website from over 3,500 individuals, up from last year
- Four newsletters were emailed or posted out to members and subscribers, plus all members notified by post of the AGM and proposed minor changes to the Trust Deed
- Regular media releases, resulting in several articles about WET's activities in local media.
