

Extensive and varied habitat

Harts Creek, Irwell river, Yarrs flat, Lakeside, Boggy creek, Halswell river, LII river

- Food availability
- Sparse and low human disturbance
- Where else is there to go?!


Aims-

DOC 200 and 250 Timms traps Goodnature A12


Newly installed lines at Lakeside and Halswell River mouth

What have we found so far? Call monitoring

Listening stations- Harts Creek and Timber yard point, LII river mouth, Halswell river mouth

Acoustic recorder sites- Taumutu, Lakeside reserve, Boggy Creek and Irwell river.




